Revitalization Plan for the Beach-To-Bay corridor takes shape What happens to The Lodge?

At a public workshop on October 13, the engineering firm hired by the city presented their recommendations for revitalizing the environs of JFK Boulevard to make the area more enticing to visitors. The whole project is expected to cost nearly 13.5 million dollars. The recommended concepts are not finalized, but unless the public reacts, they will be.

Of particular interest to us, the Community Lodge will remain for our use – with improved restrooms. There are options for extending the building, but these options are not expected to be implemented. Many other changes are in the works, including moving the lighthouse (which will include a tourist information center) to the corner of JFK and Central Ave. Stay aware of future public meetings.

How about a terrapin statue for the Beach-To-Bay corridor?

A committee has been formed to advocate the inclusion of a diamond terrapin statue in the Beach-To-Bay project. Members are Irene Jameson and Bob Thibault, along with SIC councilpersons Mary Tighe and John Divney. The committee believes that such a statue would provide a unique environmental symbol as well as a memorable tourist attraction. Stay tuned.

Donations grow in memory of Marie Stafford

According to Mike Stafford, contributions to the SIC Historical Society in honor of Marie have now exceeded \$2700. The funds will be used to provide a beautiful new bridal display in Marie's beloved Bridal Room when the museum moves to its new location in the future SIC library complex at 48th Street and Central Avenue.

Wherefore art thou, Library?

Last heard, Cape May County was in the process of preparing plans and specifications for the new SIC library, with a bid package expected to be published before the end of the year. Ground-breaking may take place as early as February.

Funland looks to the future

In its first season of operation, Gillian's Funland reported revenue of about \$384,500, with ten percent going to Sea Isle City. For 2010, plans include possible expansion to the west and a repositioning of some of the rides.

Water and Sewer – still a hot topic

An October 24 City Council workshop covered two related topics: reduction of city-wide costs (the main presentation topic) and the equitable distribution of rates. The former is being addressed by emphasis on reduced usage and repair/upgrade of facilities. The approach to equitable distribution of costs among businesses, rentals, and year-round residents is not there yet. Attend the meetings to find out more and to have your voice heard.

Sea Isle City, Avalon, and Stone Harbor now share Comcast Channel 2 to bring information meetings, events, weather, emergency info, and more - to the public. Try it. You may have to persevere through Stone Harbor or Avalon items for a few minutes, but it should be worth it.

For emergency information, sign up for "Reverse 911"

The Sea Isle City Police Department has set up an Emergency Notification System, commonly referred to as "Reverse 911." This system can inform residents of important events and emergency situations by placing phone calls to thousands of people within minutes. You can sign up to receive these calls either via the city website "www.seaislecitynj.us" or by calling the City Clerk's Office at 263-4461 ext. 200.

Sea Isle City does have a plan for emergencies

This was stated at the October 13 City Council meeting. It was also stated that the essence of the plan should be presented to the council and to the public.

On a related topic, Police Chief Thomas D'Intino confirmed at the Council meeting on October 27 that two-way traffic is allowed on Pleasure Ave during flood emergencies; this is his call as SIC head of Emergency Management. Chief D'Intino is working out a scheme to inform the public when two-way traffic is in effect. Until then, use your judgement and your flashers.


